 At Island School I was introduced to Summerbridge, a program that brought teachers from around the world with local students where we all learned to work together despite cultural and language barriers.

And finally, the confidence to go beyond myself - to reach places I never thought I could reach.

- I came into Island School an average student I needed to take ESL classes, I lacked confidence and I stuttered when speaking in front of an audience.
- I was terrible in writing subjects like History.
- One history teacher of mine, Mr. Forse, encouraged me to keep practicing my writing.
- So in preparing for my exams I wrote essays, and I faxed them over to him late into the night.
- Minutes later, he would fax me right back with his feedback and corrections.
- I failed many times in writing those essays.
- But he kept faxing me back. So I just kept on writing.
- I was predicted to get a B in that class.
- I ended up graduating with an A*. Most importantly I graduated with the self confidence that I could go beyond myself.

Some of us here may already be busy working on our own amazing projects, for others it's yet to come. But all of us here can make a difference by supporting in whatever way we can the next generation to make their own dent in this crazy world.
